# February 11 Scoop of History: Polo: Past and Present ... Jim Holland

Polo: the Sport of Kings was also the sport of cavalrymen and ranchers in the Black Hills of South Dakota starting more than a century ago.

horsemanship skills.

Polo involves mounted riders using the speed of their horses and their skill to advance a small ball, scoring points by using a wooden mallet to strike the ball between

The game of Polo was likely played first by nomadic warriors more than two thousand years ago and eventually became an equestrian sporting tradition in the British Empire by the late 1800s.

Nancy Thompson Harlan and Kurt Ketelsen both grew up around the sport in rural Meade County and presented *Polo: Past and Present*, a look at the game's heyday in western South Dakota, during the Sturgis & Meade County Historical Society's quarterly Scoop of History on Feb. 11 at the Sturgis Public Library.

The game's popularity was boosted locally in the early 1900s, with the U.S. Army's Fourth Cavalry soldiers stationed at Fort Meade, playing Polo as both a recreation and a way for cavalrymen to hone their

two goal posts at either end of the field. Matches consist of four chukkers, or periods.

Polo became established in the 1920s and 1930s. According to a sign at Fort Meade, the first South Dakota Polo Tournament was held there in 1928 and included teams from Hot Springs and Pierre.

Teams from Sturgis and Fort Meade also participated in a June 29 – July 5, 1931 tournament at Fort Robinson, Neb.

Also back then, Meade County rancher Ingwer (Ket) Ketelsen, was buying and selling horses. Asa (Pop) Tyler, a Pierre area rancher, also raised and sold thoroughbred horses to teams and players on the East Coast.

"Ket" Ketelsen, who had played on the

Fame in 2015 for his contribution to Polo's growth in the state. He played the game until he was 84.


Bud's wife Dorothy was the first American woman to play the game competitively. A brother, Toby, and sons Ronnie and Lyle also played.

Local matches were played in both outdoor and indoor arenas. An indoor/outdoor arena located in a natural amphitheater two miles north of Sturgis, opened in 1957. The indoor arenas were not necessarily under a roof, but bordered by a wall or fence.

Polo continued to be played locally until the 1990s, including matches at a field in east Rapid City and south at Hart Ranch.

On display during the presentation was a variety of polo gear, mallets, wooden and

plastic balls, head gear, special saddles, boots, leg protectors and gloves.

Also attending were other local residents, including Bud Aga of Sturgis, Karyl Ketelsen Meyer) who related his experiences playing the game and Historical Society vice-president Ross Lamphere, who used to earn money walking horses to help them cool down after the spirited play of a chukker.

## Replaying a Scoop of History: First Presbyterian Church



The First Presbyterian Church of Sturgis is showing a Scoop of History video featuring the history of the church and the stained glass windows in the church.


You are invited to a potluck that will be served as 11:30 a.m. on May 28, 2023, in the downstairs fellowship hall.

The "new" Presbyterian Church, the cornerstone of which was laid on March 29, 1967 (Photo courtesy First Presbyterian Church)


recorded April 8, 2018. Rev. Denzel Nonhof and Linda Beulke prepared the slides and wrote most of the presentation. See you there!



## **Update from Bear Butte Creek Historic Preservation Council**

he final report on this year's "Dig" was sent to the

Deadwood Historic Preservation Office to complete our requirements of receiving their grant. We are awaiting reimbursement and will complete paying any outstanding expenses.

Since my last communication we have some great news. Our application for another Deadwood grant was awarded for more than we even requested. This 'never' happens according to their staff. We received a \$10,000 grant for our next dig in September of 2023. We also carried over a \$5,000 grant from Black Hills Community Foundation for a total of \$15,000 to apply to the upcoming year's work.

Dr Sundstrom will again lead our efforts along with many dedicated volunteers. I have asked Logan Lamphere to begin planning for the possibility of including a Historical Marker/ Informational Kiosk to be included in our funding for this year's dig.

With the passing of Board member Jace Decory I have inquired of Brenda Shirts to be nominated to our Board as a voting member. She recently accepted a position with NRCS and has checked with them concerning any conflict- of- interest issues about serving on our Board. No concerns of a conflict of interest were given. We will accept additional nominations and will vote at our next meeting. Brenda has served on our Board as a non- voting member since our inception.

Katie Anderson presented an excellent program on Soap Suds Row at the Tri State Museum & Visitor Center in Belle Fourche to 50+ people recently. Katie was one of our volunteers at this year's Dig. She is a graduate of University of Wyoming with a degree in Archeology planning to get an advanced degree. Thank you to Katie for your involvement in our project and helping to spread the word about our Historic Preservation.
