laundresses and their families.

Last year's team led by Dr. Linea Sundstrom found remnants of a log cabin that may have been the home of Army laundress Rose Courtney, who died in a house fire on November 29, 1907, according to the Sturgis Weekly Record.

The University of South Dakota archaeological field school crew also conducted an archaeological survey of the terrace Soap Suds Row sits on. The survey will help point to locations for future digs.

"I'd like to become a museum curator or professor," said Natalie Wagner from Chatham, Illinois, an Anthropology major at USD.

"I'm looking forward to getting first -hand experience that will help with

the future," said Angel Vazquez of Flandreau, a double-major in Anthropology and Sustainability. "I'm

especially interested in pre-historic cultural anthropology." One of the questions the group still hopes to answer is whether any intact pre-contact (pre-fort) deposits remain of Native American activity, both recent and ancient.


# Fort Meade Museum Hosting Jeff Barnes September 8

# James D. Sadler ... Lee Stroschine

ames D. Sadler was a Civil War veteran that served and retired at Fort Meade who had an interest in things other than his military duties.

James was born in Ontario, Canada, on August 18, 1843. He served in the 11th U.S. Infantry from 1864 to 1866, reaching the rank of Orderly or First Sergeant. During the war years when James was in the 11th Infantry, he was involved in battles around Richmond, Virginia, including the Second Battle of Petersburg.

In 1866, James was on duty at Libby Prison in Richmond, Virginia. Later, in 1867, James requested to be appointed as a hospital steward with the U.S. Army.

He states in his application that he had served three years as a hospital steward in the British Army. He was appointed hospital steward in 1867 and his first duty was again in Richmond, Virginia.

He remained in Virginia until 1870 when he was assigned to Dakota Territory. James served most of the rest of his career in Dakota Territory ex-

Some of the posts in Dakota Territory that he was stationed at were Ft. Randall, Ft. Seward, Ft. Yates and Ft. Meade. He was transferred from Ft. Yates to Ft. Meade in November 1888, and retired there in November 1892 after serving almost thirty years in the Army, 25 as a hospital steward.

A hospital steward was the pharmacist for the doctor, took care of minor medical issues, and—at a post that had a hospital like Fort Meade—was the hospital administrator. In 1883, James applied for and was granted U.S. citizenship.

During the years after he retired, James ran for and served in different elected offices in Sturgis and Meade County including coroner and justice of the peace. James married Ida Melton in 1866. They had no children and lived in Sturgis until James died on May 5, 1913.

A *Sturgis Weekly Record* article in 1892 reports that "Hospital Steward J. D. Sadler of Fort Meade has, without exception, the finest collection of Indian relics and curios in the United States."

The article also states, "There hangs the stone pipe of Sitting Bull (not the imitation pipe that decorates every dime museum in the country, but the pipe that the chief himself smoked and gave to Sadler with his own hands.)"

James Sadler is mentioned in a 2010 Cowan's auction of American Indian & Western Art, regarding a Sioux Catlinite Pipe with Sitting Bull Provenance

The auction website states, "Included is a typed affidavit dated December 8, 1933, which states: I hereby certify that this pipe is the genuine Sitting Bull peace pipe. And was obtained by Hospital Steward James D. Sadler, U.S.A., who served for 30 years in the United States Army from July 14th, 1864 until November 29th, 1892. When he retired from actual

service, and at his death on May 5th, 1913 he left the said pipe to me. - Signed Charles E. Nickles in Tama-Cooper, South Dakota."

The 1910 census records show that James Sadler and Charles Nickles were neighbors living in Sturgis Ward 1, Meade, South Dakota. James's obituary mentions a niece, Mrs. Nickles, with whom Mrs. Sadler would be making her home.
